# 361 – Hark! 'Tis The Shepherd's Voice I Hear (Bring them in)


1). Hark! 'Tis the Shepherd's voice I hear,

he was even troubled by doubts as to whether Jesus was really the Messiah. So he sent some of his followers to ask the Saviour: {SJ 79.7}



# Research Reverence the Sabbath

"And ye shall serve the Lord your God, and he shall bless thy bread, and thy water; and I will take sickness away from the midst of thee" (Exodus 23:25).

"The restored paralytic stooped to take up his bed, which was only a rug and blanket, and as he straightened himself again with a sense of delight, he looked around for his Deliverer; but Jesus was lost in the crowd. The man feared that he would not know Him if he should see Him again. As he hurried on his way with firm, free step, praising God and rejoicing in his new-found strength, he met several of the Pharisees, and immediately told them of his cure. He was surprised at the coldness with which they listened to his story.

"With lowering brows they interrupted him, asking why he was carrying his bed on the Sabbath day. They sternly reminded him that it was not lawful to bear burdens on the Lord's day. In his joy the man had forgotten that it was the Sabbath; yet he felt no condemnation for obeying the command of One who had such power from God. He answered boldly, 'He that made me whole, the same said unto me, Take up thy bed, and walk.' They asked who it was that had done this, but he could not tell. These rulers knew well that only One had shown Himself able to perform this miracle; but they wished for direct proof that it was Jesus, that they

might condemn Him as a Sabbathbreaker. In their judgment He had not only broken the law in healing the sick man on the Sabbath, but had committed sacrilege in bidding him bear away his bed." (The Desire of Ages 203-204)

#### Reverence the Sabbath






The sick man, now well, had not broken the Sabbath. Jesus had not broken the Sabbath, but He always reverenced the Sabbath day. But Jesus' ideas on how to keep the Sabbath were not like the ideas of the doctors of the law and the scribes and Pharisees. The question was simply a matter of whose ideas were right. There was no question then about what day was the Sabbath, but instead it was, "How should the Sabbath be reverenced?" In our day church people are still having serious disagreement over the same question—are God's ideas about how to keep Sabbath right or man's ideas? Man's ideas are very different from God's ideas. Man has even changed the day so that many are reverencing Sunday, a common working day. Just as Jesus was called a Sabbathbreaker when He was really keeping the Sabbath truly, so God's people will someday be persecuted for not reverencing man-made ideas about the Sunday—Sabbath.

# **Fomentations**

#### **Materials Needed**

- 1. A steamer with boiling water in the bottom
- 2. Four or more fomentation cloths (made from 1/2 wool and 1/2 cotton—30 to 36 inches square [.9-1.08 meters])
- 3. Several large towels
- 4. A washcloth and a pan of cold water
- 5. Tongs
- Or you could use an electric, moist, heating pad



# Fomentations Cont.

#### **How to Proceed**

- 1. Make sure the room is warm with no drafts on the patient.
- 2. Have the water boiling in the steamer. Fold the fomentation cloths into about three thicknesses. Place these cloths into the steamer. When they are sufficiently moist and hot use your tongs to lift them out of the pan. Wrap in a dry fomentation cloth and then roll up to hold heat. Carry it to the patient to apply.
- 3. Uncover the place to be treated. Place the fomentation and cover with a towel.

- 4. Be careful not to burn the patient. You could rub underneath it until the patient can take the increase of heat.
- 5. Leave each fomentation on about three to five minutes. Always have another ready to replace the one that is removed. Dry the area and put another fomentation on it; expose it as little as possible.
- 6. Put three fomentations on. When the last is removed, cool the area with a washcloth wrung from cold water, then dry thoroughly.
- 7. Cover, have patient rest quietly and keep them warm for awhile (1/2 to 1 hour at least).

#### **Purpose**

- To relieve congestion for a chest cold. Increase circulation to an area.
- Neuralgia—(outbreak of pain along a nerve).
- 3. Arthritis—painful joints.
- Decrease of pain in an inflamed area by bringing blood to the surface.
- Given on the spine (not too hot) for nervousness, as a sedative.



### Being Careful

- 1. Have a warm room (75°-80° F [24°-27° C]). Be careful not to chill the patient during treatment.
- 2. The feet should be kept warm during the treatment.
- 3. Always wipe skin before the next fomentation.

- Change fomentations quickly and the part treated should not be left without protection.
- 5. If the patient perspires freely, dry after the treatment and rub with alcohol. A cool cloth can be kept on the forehead or neck during the treatment. The head should be kept cool.

#### Chapter 21 – Bethesda and the Sanhedrin, Part 3

The Jews had so perverted the law that they made it a yoke of bondage.

Their meaningless requirements had become a byword among other nations.

Especially was the Sabbath hedged in by all manner of senseless restrictions.

It was not to them a delight, the holy of the Lord, and honorable.

The scribes and Pharisees had made its observance an intolerable burden.

A Jew was not allowed to kindle a fire nor even to light a candle on the Sabbath.

As a consequence the people were dependent upon the Gentiles for many services which their rules forbade them to do for themselves. They did not reflect that if these acts were sinful, those who employed others to perform them were as guilty as if they had done the work themselves.

They thought that salvation was restricted to the Jews, and that the condition of all others, being already hopeless, could be made no worse.

But God has given no commandments which cannot be obeyed by all.

His laws sanction no unreasonable or selfish restrictions. {DA 204.1}


In the temple Jesus met the man who had been healed. He had come to bring a sin offering and also a thank offering for the great mercy he had received.

Finding him among the worshipers, Jesus made Himself known, with the warning words, "Behold, thou art made whole: sin no more, lest a worse thing come unto thee." {DA 204.2}


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# Continuing our Reference Reading for Tiny Tot's Lesson REVIEW!

The healed man was overjoyed at meeting his Deliverer. Ignorant of the enmity toward Jesus, he told the Pharisees who had questioned him, that this was He who had performed the cure. "Therefore did the Jews persecute Jesus, and sought to slay Him, because He had done these things on the Sabbath day." {DA 204.3} Jesus was brought before the Sanhedrin to answer the charge of Sabbathbreaking. Had the Jews at this time been an independent nation, such a charge would have served their purpose for putting Him to death. This their subjection to the Romans prevented. The Jews had not the power to inflict capital punishment, and the accusations brought against Christ would have no weight in a Roman court. There were other objects, however, which they hoped to secure. Notwithstanding their efforts to counteract His work, Christ was gaining, even in Jerusalem, an influence over the people greater than their own. Multitudes who were not interested in the harangues of the rabbis were attracted by His teaching. They could understand His words, and their hearts were warmed and comforted. He spoke of God, not as an avenging judge, but as a tender father, and He revealed the image of God as mirrored in Himself. His words were like balm to the wounded spirit. Both by His words and by His works of mercy He was breaking the oppressive power of the old traditions and man-made commandments, and presenting the love of God in its exhaustless fullness. {DA 204.4} **The Desire of Ages**










Pilate had a desire to know the truth. His mind was confused. He eagerly grasped the words of the Saviour, and his heart was stirred with a great longing to know what it really was, and how he could obtain it. "What is truth?" he inquired. But he did not wait for an answer. The tumult outside recalled him to the interests of the hour; for the priests were clamorous for immediate action. Going out to the Jews, he declared emphatically, "I find in Him no fault at all." **{DA 727.4}** 




These words from a heathen judge were a scathing rebuke to the perfidy and falsehood of the rulers of Israel who were accusing the Saviour. As the priests and elders heard this from Pilate, their disappointment and rage knew no bounds. They had long plotted and waited for this opportunity. {Next Slide Please}



**Continuing:** 

As they saw the prospect of the release of Jesus, they seemed ready to tear Him in pieces. They loudly denounced Pilate, and threatened him with the censure of the Roman government. They accused him of refusing to condemn Jesus, who, they affirmed, had set Himself up against Caesar. **{DA 727.5}** 



Angry voices were now heard, declaring that the seditious influence of Jesus was well known throughout the country.

The priests said, "He stirreth up the people, teaching throughout all Jewry, beginning from Galilee to this place." {DA 728.1}


Pilate at this time had no thought of condemning Jesus.

He knew that the Jews had accused Him through hatred and prejudice.

He knew what his duty was.

Justice demanded that Christ should be immediately released.

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**Continuing:** 


But Pilate dreaded the ill will of the people. Should he refuse to give Jesus into their hands, a tumult would be raised, and this he feared to meet. When he heard that Christ was from Galilee, he decided to send Him to Herod, the ruler of that province, who was then in Jerusalem. By this course, Pilate thought to shift the responsibility of the trial from himself to Herod. He also thought this a good opportunity to heal an old quarrel between himself and Herod. And so it proved.

The two magistrates made friends over the trial of the Saviour.



Pilate delivered Jesus again to the soldiers, and amid the jeers and insults of the mob He was hurried to the judgment hall of Herod. "When Herod saw Jesus, he was exceeding glad." He had never before met the Saviour, but "he was desirous to see Him of a long season, because he had heard many things of Him; and he hoped to have seen some miracle done by Him." {Next Slide Please}



**Continuing:** This Herod was he whose hands were stained with the blood of John the Baptist. When Herod first heard of Jesus, he was terror-stricken, and said, "It is John, whom I beheaded: he is risen from the dead;" "therefore mighty works do show forth themselves in him." **Mark 6:16; Matthew 14:2.** Yet Herod desired to see Jesus. {Next Slide Please}



**Continuing:** 

Now there was opportunity to save the life of this prophet, and the king hoped to banish forever from his mind the memory of that bloody head brought to him in a charger. He also desired to have his curiosity gratified, and thought that if Christ were given any prospect of release, He would do anything that was asked of Him. **{DA 728.3}** 



A large company of the priests and elders had accompanied Christ to Herod. And when the Saviour was brought in, these dignitaries, all speaking excitedly, urged their accusations against Him. **But Herod paid little** regard to their charges. He commanded silence, desiring an opportunity to question Christ. **{Next Slide Please}** 



He ordered that the fetters of Christ should be unloosed, at the same time charging His enemies with roughly treating Him.

Looking with compassion into the serene face of the world's Redeemer, he read in it only wisdom and purity. He as well as Pilate was satisfied that Christ had been accused through malice and envy. **{DA 729.1}**


## Children Activity Book Year 2 Quarter 4 – Lesson 13 – Page 346 **SonLight Education Ministry Homeschooling from the Bible**
