

He said to them: **{SJ 102.4**}


"Tarry ye here, and watch with Me." Matthew 26:38. {SJ 102.5}

He felt that by sin He was being separated from the Father. The gulf between them

appeared so broad, so black, so deep, that He shuddered before it. {SJ 102.6}

Christ was not suffering for his own sins, <u>but for the sins of the world</u>. He was feeling the displeasure of God against sin as the sinner will feel it













Continuing: In His agony, Christ clung to the cold ground.

From His pale lips came the bitter cry, "O My Father, if it be possible, let this cup pass from Me; nevertheless not as I will, but as Thou wilt." **Matthew 26:39. {SJ 102.8**}

<u>For an hour Christ</u> bore this terrible suffering alone. Then He came to the disciples, hoping for some word of sympathy. But no sympathy awaited Him, for they were asleep.

They awoke at the sound of His voice, but they hardly knew Him,

His face was so changed by anguish. Addressing Peter, He said: **{SJ 103.1}** 

"Simon, sleepest thou? Couldest not thou watch one hour?" Mark 14:37. {SJ 103.2}

Just before He bent His footsteps to the garden, Christ had said to the disciples,

"All ye shall be offended because of Me this night." They had given Him the strongest assurance that they would go with Him to prison and to death.

And poor, self-sufficient Peter had added, "Although all shall be offended, yet will not I."






#### The Favor

### Kindness

When you are <u>kind</u> to your pets, be reminded of how Jesus came to the well to care for the spiritual needs of the woman.

He was kind to her.



"And God said, Behold I have given you every herb bearing seed, which is upon the face of all the earth, and every tree, in the which is a <u>fruit</u> of a tree yielding seed; to you it shall be for meat" (Genesis 1:29). By this test we see that fruit was given for food and also for "yielding seed." This last phrase refers to how fruit reproduces itself. While God designed the pulp and juice of fruit for man to eat the seed was meant to be sown so that we would never run out of fruit to eat.



A fruit is the part of a flowering plant or tree that contains the plant's seeds. So it seems fruits would include such things as acorns, cucumbers, to-matoes, and wheat grains. However, we usually refer to fruit as the juicy, sweet or tart kinds of foods such as apples, bananas, grapes, oranges, peaches, pears, and strawberries.



To prevent confusion horticulturists (people who study how to cultivate plants and gardens) define a fruit as an edible seed-bearing structure that (1) consists of fleshy tissue and (2) is produced by a perennial. Remember, a perennial is a plant that lives for more than two years without needing to be replanted. The horticulturists' definition of a fruit excludes nuts and vegetables. Nuts are firm rather than fleshy and most vegetables are annuals. An annual is a plant that lives for only one season.




God wisely supplies us with different kinds of fruits at different seasons of the year. In the warm and thirsty season, He bestows upon us luscious fruits filled with refreshing juices such as peaches, apricots, and grapes. Then as winter approaches the fruits become more solid and mellow as apples and pears. It is also interesting to note that the closer one travels toward the hot equator the juicier the fruits become, (such as pineapple, mangos, and guava) and the farther north one goes the more solid "fruits" such as grains become staple crops. These are an important source of slow-burning-heat for the body. God matches the "talents" or nutritional qualities of the fruits with the needs of the people who live where they grow. Each kind of fruit has its own unselfish ministry to mankind's needs. And just as surely as He wisely planned where the different kinds of fruits would be most serviceable, so also He has a special place on earth where you are to use your unique talents in unselfish ministry to others.

The individual flavors of different kinds of fruits satisfy our tastes at different times. The peculiar flavors of each are like a language our body understands. They lead us to select certain ones that

are suitable to the needs of our bodies under different conditions. If the senses have not been perverted by eating improperly it is marvelous to see how the taste for certain food elements will vary from time to time to suit the needs of the body.

Other definitions of fruit include: that which is produced (Ephesians 5:22-23); offspring as the fruit of the womb; affect or consequence (Isaiah 3:10); and advantage or profit (Romans 6:21).



Pray for the Holy Spirit to give you wisdom concerning the spiritual meanings of the various fruits. God's Word shows that they have symbolic value. Take the pomegranate, for example. The word means "grained apple." The pomegranate is all seed and all sweetness. Each pearly seed is surrounded by a bed of luscious crimson pulp. The seeds of the pomegranate look like jewels. Christian fruit should be like the pomegranate—not all sweetness without seed; nor all seed without sweetness. There should be sweetness of character combined with the seed of the Word. Fruit unto holiness, not Pharisaic righteousness, but tender loving Christlike spirituality. Pomegranates are packed with seed the way God's word is packed with promises. Its blood red juices suggests the blood of Jesus. Pomegranates were embroidered on the border of the High Priest's garments along with bells (Exodus 39:24). This teaches that we should give forth the sound as well as the fruit of holiness.


He who made the ocean, who controls the waters of the great deep, who opened the springs and channels of the earth, rested from His weariness at Jacob's well, and was dependent upon a stranger's kindness for even the gift of a drink of water. {DA 183.4} The woman saw that Jesus was a Jew. In her surprise she forgot to grant His request, but tried to learn the reason for it. "How is it," she said, "that Thou, being a Jew, askest drink of me, which am a woman of Samaria?"{DA 184.1} Jesus answered, "If thou knewest the gift of God, and who it is that saith to thee, Give Me to drink; thou wouldest have asked of Him, and He would have given thee living water." You wonder that I should ask of you even so small a favor as a draught of water from the well at our feet. Had you asked of Me, I would have given you to drink of the water of everlasting life. {DA 184.2} The woman had not comprehended the words of Christ, but she felt their solemn import. Her light, bantering manner began to change. Supposing that Jesus spoke of the well before them, she said, "Sir, Thou hast nothing to draw with, and the well is deep: from whence then hast Thou that living water? Art Thou greater than our father Jacob, which gave us the well, and drank thereof himself?" She saw before her only a thirsty traveler, wayworn and dusty. In her mind she compared Him with the honored patriarch Jacob. She cherished the feeling, which is so natural, that no other well could be equal to that provided by the fathers. She was looking backward to the fathers, forward to the Messiah's coming, while the Hope of the fathers, the Messiah Himself, was beside her, and she knew Him not. How many thirsting souls are today close by the living fountain, yet looking far away for the wellsprings of life! "Say not in thine heart, Who shall ascend into heaven? (that is, to bring Christ down from above:) or, Who shall descend into the deep? (that is, to bring up Christ again from the dead.) . . . The word is night hee, even in thy mouth, and in thy heart: . . . if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised Him from the dead, thou shalt be saved." **Romans 10:6-9. {DA 184.3**}








### **Continuing:**

With amazement angels witnessed the Saviour's despairing agony. The hosts of heaven veiled their faces from the fearful sight. **Inanimate nature expressed sympathy** with its insulted and dying Author. The sun refused to look upon the awful scene. Its full, bright rays were illuminating the earth at midday, when suddenly it seemed to be blotted out. Complete darkness, like a funeral pall, enveloped the cross. "There was darkness over all the land unto the ninth hour." There was no eclipse or other natural cause for this darkness, which was as deep as midnight without moon or stars. It was a miraculous testimony given by God that the faith of after generations


might be confirmed. {DA 753.3}


The silence of the grave seemed to have fallen upon Calvary. A nameless terror held the throng that was gathered about the cross. The cursing and reviling ceased in the midst of half-uttered sentences. Men, women, and children fell prostrate upon the earth. Vivid lightnings occasionally flashed forth from the cloud, and revealed the cross and the crucified Redeemer. {Next Slide Please}




**Continuing:** Priests, rulers, scribes, executioners, and the mob, all thought that their time of retribution had come. After a while some whispered that Jesus would now come down from the cross. 



One of the Roman soldiers, touched with pity as he looked at the parched lips, took a sponge on a stalk of hyssop, and dipping it in a vessel of vinegar, offered it to Jesus. But the priests mocked at His agony. When darkness covered the earth, {Next Slide Please}



Continuing: they had been filled with fear; as their terror abated, the dread returned that Jesus would yet escape them. His words, "Eloi, Eloi, lama sabachthani?" they had misinterpreted. With bitter contempt and scorn they said, "This man calleth for Elias." The last opportunity to relieve His sufferings they refused. "Let be," they said, "let us see whether Elias will come to save Him." **{DA 754.4.}**
