



John 18:22 And when he had thus spoken, one of the officers which stood by struck Jesus with the palm of his hand, saying, Answerest thou the high priest so?


John 18:23 Jesus answered him, If I have spoken evil, bear witness of the evil: but if well, why smitest thou me?

Chapter 18 – "Before Annas, Caiaphas, and the Sanhedrin" Part 2

Continuing: To this Jesus mildly said: "If I have spoken evil, bear witness of the evil: but if well, why smitest thou Me?" John 18:22, 23. {SJ 114.3}

Christ could have summoned legions of angels from Heaven to His aid.

But it was a part of His mission to endure in His humanity all the taunts

and insults that men might heap upon Him. {SJ 114.4}

From the house of Annas, the Saviour was taken to the palace of Caiaphas.

He was to be tried before the Sanhedrin, and while its members were being called together,

Annas and Caiaphas again questioned Him, but they gained no advantage. {SJ 114.5}

When the members of the Sanhedrin had assembled, Caiaphas took his seat as the president. On each side were the judges;

before them stood the Roman soldiers guarding

the Saviour; back of these was the accusing mob. {SJ 114.6}





Continuing: Caiaphas then bade Jesus work one of His mighty miracles before them.

But the Saviour gave no sign that He heard a word. Had He responded by even one soul-searching look, such as He gave the buyers and sellers in the temple, the whole murderous throng would have been compelled to flee from His presence. {SJ 114.7}

The Jews were at this time subject to the Romans, and were not allowed to punish any one with death. The Sanhedrin could only examine the prisoner, and pass judgment to be ratified by the Roman authorities. {SJ 115.1}


To accomplish their wicked purpose, they must find something against the Saviour that would be regarded as criminal by the Roman governor. They could secure abundant evidence that Christ had spoken against the Jewish traditions and many of their ordinances.

It was easy to prove that He had denounced the priests and scribes, and that He had called them hypocrites and murderers. But this would not be listened to by the Romans, for they



Matthew Chapter 6 (KJV)

Debts and Temptation

"And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors" (Matthew 6:12).

"Jesus teaches that we can receive forgiveness from God only as we forgive others. It is the love of God that draws us unto Him, and that love cannot touch our hearts without creating love for our brethren." (*The Mount of Blessings* 113)

We owe perfect love to God and our fellowmen, to the degree that we have not met this duty, we are debtors.

Prayer does not keep us from being tempted but it keeps us from yielding to temptation.

"And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil" (Matthew 6:13).

"Christ will never abandon the soul for whom He has died. The soul may leave Him and be overwhelmed with temptation, but Christ can never turn from one for whom He has paid the ransom of His own life. Could our spiritual vision be quickened, we should see souls bowed under oppression and burdened with grief, pressed as a cart beneath sheaves and ready to die in discouragement. We should see angels flying swiftly to aid these tempted ones, who are standing as on the brink of a precipice. The angles from heaven force back the hosts of evil that encompass these souls, and guide them to plant their feet on the sure foundation.

The battles waging between the two armies are as real as those fought by the armies of this world, and on the issue of the spiritual conflict eternal destinies depend." (*The Mount of Blessings* 118-119)

"Forgiveness" means the repentant person is sent away in peace.

"Debts" mean moral and spiritual indebtedness; we owe something or we have neglected to do something.

Debt = Sin Debtor = Sinner

"Temptation" means trial or test. God will not remove them but sustains us through them. As much as we can, we should avoid being tempted. We cannot sincerely ask God to "lead us not into temptation" if we walk into it on purpose.

"For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever: Amen" (Matthew 6:13).

"The last like the first sentence of the Lord's Prayer, points to our Father as above all power and authority and every name that is named." (*The Mount* of Blessings 120)

> "...We can receive forgiveness from God only as we forgive others."

"Thine, O Lord, is the greatness, and the power, and the glory, and the victory, and the majesty: for all that is in the heaven and in the earth is thine; thine is the kingdom, O Lord, and thou art exalted as head above all.

"Both riches and honour come of thee, and thou reignest over all; and in thine hand is power and might; and in thine hand it is to make great, and to give strength unto all" (I Chronicles 29:11-12).

Now that we better understand the Lord's Prayer we can with true **reverence** say it! (Kneel as a family and say it.)


Hair

something is safe to eat.



Sapphire Tower/Puya Alpestris



Origin : *Puya alpestris* is native to south-central <u>Chile</u>. It grows on dry slopes in the Andes at elevations of up to 6,560 feet (2,200 m). <u>Puya alpestris (Sapphire Tower) - World of Succulents</u>



Sapphire Tower/Puya Alpestris

Puya alpestris (**Sapphire Tower**) – This plant forms a 2-3 foot tall clump to rosettes of recurving, spiny-margined, light green leaves that are silver-gray beneath. The leaves about 1 inch wide at their base and narrowing along the 18-24 inches in length. In spring, but often not every year, appear turquoise blue-green flowers (sometimes <u>called metallic</u> or "<u>unearthly</u>") with vivid orange stamen anthers held on branched 3 to 4 foot tall stalks. Each branch of the inflorescence terminates in a long sterile branch that acts as a perch

in a long sterile branch that acts as a perch for nectar feeding birds - flowers are also very attractive to bees as the nectar is sweet. Plant in full sun in a well-drained soil where it is drought tolerant but it can also be irrigated more regularly.

"The rainbow lorikeet occurs in a wide variety of habitats, from human settlements to forest, coconut plantations, savannah, eucalyptus stands and mangroves. Although the lorikeet inhabits most types of lowland and wooded country within its range, including swamp forest and secondary growth, it tends to favor edges and disturbed vegetation rather than interior or closed-canopy formations, j Lorikeets typically occur from sea level to more than 2000', but will occasionally ascend higher depending on the island's elevation."

Chapter 5 - The Lord's Prayer, Part 3

"Forgive us our sins; for we also forgive everyone that is indebted to us." Luke 11:4.

"Jesus teaches that we can receive forgiveness from God only as we forgive others.

It is the love of God that draws us unto Him,

and that love cannot touch our hearts without creating love for our brethren. {MB 113.2}

After completing the Lord's Prayer, Jesus added: "If ye forgive men their trespasses, your heavenly
Father will also forgive you: but if ye forgive not men their trespasses, neither will your Father
forgive your trespasses." He who is unforgiving cuts off the very channel through which alone he can
receive mercy from God. We should not think that unless those who have injured us confess the

wrong we are justified in withholding from them our forgiveness. It is their part, no doubt, to humble their hearts by repentance and confession; but we are to have a spirit of compassion

toward those who have trespassed against us, whether or not they confess their faults.

However sorely they may have wounded us, we are not to cherish our grievances and sympathize with ourselves over our injuries; but as we hope to be pardoned for our offenses against God we are to pardon all who have done evil to us. {MB 113.3}

The prayer, "Bring us not into temptation," is itself a promise. If we commit ourselves to God we have the assurance, He "will not suffer you to be tempted above that ye are able; but will with the temptation also make a way to escape, that ye may be able to bear it."

1 Corinthians 10:13. {MB 118.2}

The only safeguard against evil is the indwelling of Christ in the heart through faith in His righteousness. It is because selfishness exists in our hearts that temptation has power over us.

Continuing: But when we behold the great love of God, selfishness appears to us in its hideous and repulsive character, and we desire to have it expelled from the soul.

As the Holy Spirit glorifies Christ, our hearts are softened and subdued, the temptation loses its power, and the grace of Christ transforms the character." {MB 118.3}

The soul may leave Him and be overwhelmed with temptation, but Christ can never turn from one for whom He has paid the ransom of His own life. Live in contact with the living Christ, and He will hold you firmly by a hand that will never let go.








At last Jesus was at rest. The long day of shame and torture was ended. As the last rays of the setting sun ushered in the Sabbath, the Son of God lay in quietude in Joseph's tomb. His work completed, His hands folded in peace, He rested through the sacred hours of the Sabbath day. **{DA 769.1}**



In the beginning the Father and the Son had rested upon the Sabbath after Their work of creation. When "the heavens and the earth were finished, and all the host of them" (Genesis 2:1), the Creator and all heavenly beings rejoiced in contemplation of the glorious scene. "The morning stars sang together, and all the sons of God shouted for joy." Job 38:7. {Next Slide Please}






Continuing: the result to flow from Christ's completed work, God and angels saw. With this scene the day upon which Jesus rested is forever linked. For "His work is perfect;" and "whatsoever God doeth, it shall be forever." **Deuteronomy 32:4**; Ecclesiastes 3:14. When there shall be a "restitution of all things, **{Let us Praise our God}**



Continuing: Now Jesus rested from the work of redemption; and though there was grief among those who loved Him on earth, yet there was joy in heaven. Glorious to the eyes of heavenly beings was the promise of the future. A restored creation, a redeemed race, that having conquered sin could never fall,--this, {Next Slide Please}




Continuing: which God hath spoken by the mouth of all His holy prophets since the world began" (Acts 3:21), the creation Sabbath, the day on which Jesus lay at rest in Joseph's tomb, will still be a day of rest and rejoicing. Heaven and earth will unite in praise, as "from one Sabbath to another" (Isaiah 66:23) the nations of the saved shall bow in joyful worship to God and the Lamb. **{DA 769.2}**




In the closing events of the crucifixion day, fresh evidence was given of the fulfillment of prophecy, and new witness borne to Christ's divinity. When the darkness had lifted from the cross, and the Saviour's dying cry had been uttered, immediately another voice was heard, saying, "Truly this was the Son of God." Matthew 27:54. **{DA 770.1}**




These words were said in no whispered tones. All eyes were turned to see whence they came. Who had spoken? It was the centurion, the Roman soldier. The divine patience of the Saviour, and His sudden death, with the cry of victory upon His lips, had impressed this heathen. In the bruised, broken body hanging upon the cross, the centurion recognized the form of the Son of God. **{Next Slide Please}**



He could not refrain from confessing his faith. Thus again evidence was given that our Redeemer was to see of the travail of His soul. **Upon the very day** of His death, three men, differing widely from one another, had declared their faith,--he who commanded the Roman guard, he who bore the cross of the Saviour, and he who died upon the cross at His side. **{DA 770.2}**



As evening drew on, an unearthly stillness hung over Calvary. The crowd dispersed, and many returned to Jerusalem greatly changed in spirit from what they had been in the morning. Many had flocked to the crucifixion from curiosity, and not from hatred toward Christ. Still they believed the accusations of the priests, and looked upon Christ as a malefactor. Under an unnatural excitement they had united with the mob in railing against Him. But when the earth was wrapped in blackness, {Next Slide Please}



Continuing: and they stood accused by their own consciences, they felt guilty of a great wrong. No jest or mocking laughter was heard in the midst of that fearful gloom; and when it was lifted, they made their way to their homes in solemn silence. They were convinced that the charges of the priests were false, that Jesus was no pretender; and a few weeks later, when Peter preached upon the day of Pentecost, they were among the thousands who became converts to Christ. {DA 770.3}
