

Continuing: At daybreak <u>He was again brought before His judges</u>, and the final sentence of condemnation was pronounced. **{SJ 117.6}** <u>A satanic fury then took possession of the leaders and the people.</u> The roar of voices was like that of wild beasts. They made a rush for Jesus, crying, "He is guilty, put Him to death!" and had it not been for the soldiers, He would have been torn in pieces. But Roman authority interposed, and by force of arms restrained the violence of the mob. **{SJ 117.7**} Priests, rulers, and the rabble joined in abusing the Saviour. An old garment was thrown over His head; and His persecutors struck Him in the face, saying: {SJ 117.8] (Next Slide)




Continuing: "Prophesy unto us, Thou Christ, Who is he that smote Thee?" Matthew 26:68. {SJ 117.9}



The Pharisee & The Publican

"The publican had gone to the temple with other worshipers, but he soon drew apart from them as unworthy to unite in their devotions. Standing afar off, he 'would not lift up so much as his eyes unto heaven, but smote upon his breast,' in bitter anguish and self-abhorrence. He felt that he had transgressed against God, that he was sinful and polluted. He could not expect even pity from those around him, for they looked upon him with contempt. He knew that he had no merit to commend him to God, and in utter self-despair he cried, 'God be merciful to me a sinner.' He did not compare himself with others. Overwhelmed with a sense of his guilt, he stood as if alone in God's presence. His only desire was for pardon and peace, his only plea was the mercy of God. And he was blessed. *I tell you*, Christ said, 'this man went down to his house justified rather than the other.

"The Pharisee and the publican represent two great classes into which those who come to worship God are divided. Their first two representatives are found in the first two children that were born into the world. Cain thought himself righteous, and he came to God with a thank offering only. He made no confession of sin, and acknowledged no need of mercy. But Abel came with the blood that pointed to the Lamb of God. 





Birch trees (genus Betula) are flowering medium-sized deciduous trees with thin papery bark and egg-shaped pointed leaves. Birch trees have spectacular fall colors that can be golden yellow, vibrant orange, or fiery red. Common birch trees get their names from the bark's distinctive colors, which can be white, silver, black, gray, or yellow.

Common species of birch include the white birch, silver birch, and paper birch. Typically, you can identify birch trees by their bark, leaves, and flowers. For example, some birches have thin peeling bark that exfoliates in long strips, whereas some species don't peel. Also, birch leaves can be eggshaped, triangular, or diamond-shaped.



Deer have a very interesting history in Ohio. Before European settlement, when Ohio was 95% forested, deer were not super abundant. They are edge animals, not animals of the deep primeval forest. As the forests were cleared, deer quickly expanded their populations around those clearings.

Rose Garden At Lakeview Park, Lorain, Ohio Lakeview Park – Lorain County Metro Parks




The Rose Garden at Lakeview Park was originally dedicated on May 30, 1932 and was sponsored by 17 community organizations, including the Lorain Rotary. The shape of the garden, a wheel with 8 spokes, is the Rotary Club emblem. Approximately 2,500 roses are planted in 48 beds with connecting walkways, completing the Rotary wheel and spokes.




Fish need oxygen to live. There is oxygen in the water, and most fish get it by using their gills. The blood inside their gills takes the oxygen from the water. To keep a connection with heaven one must have the Holy Spirit—the Breath of Life. Stephen had such a connection.

The fish takes a big gulp of water then closes its mouth. This pushes the water between the gills. The blood in the gills takes the oxygen. Next, the blood carries the oxygen through the body and the water goes out through the gill opening.



Stingray Anatomy




The tail of a sting ray is used for stinging. They have one or more sharp spines, like an arrow, on the tail which they use for defense. The spines are connected to a poison sac and their sting is very painful. The wrong spirit, such as the council that tried Stephen, were like stinging spines. 

Sharks Are Fish



2. <u>Sharks</u>, <u>chimaeras</u>, and <u>rays</u> have a skeleton of cartilage. Cartilage is soft bone that can bend a little but is still very tough. Sharks and rays are covered with lots of tiny scales that are half buried in the skin. They live mainly in salt water. There are about 790 species in this group and come in many sizes and shapes. Usually fish will never attack a human being. A few that will, are certain sharks (hammerhead and great white sharks), barracudas, and moray eels may attack if provoked. Some fish that could harm humans if they come in contact are stingrays and stonefish, because of their poisonous spines.

Continuing:

For each of the classes represented by the Pharisee and the publican there is a lesson in the history of the apostle Peter. In his early discipleship Peter thought himself strong. Like the Pharisee, in his own estimation he was "not as other men are" When Christ on the eve of His betrayal forewarned His disciples, "All ye shall be offended because of Me this night," Peter confidently declared, "Although all shall be offended, yet will not I." Mark 14:27, 29. Peter did not know his own danger. Self confidence misled him. He thought himself able to withstand temptation:

Self-confidence misled him. He thought himself able to withstand temptation; but in a few short hours the test came, and with cursing and swearing he denied his Lord. {COL 152.2}

When the crowing of the cock reminded him of the words of Christ, surprised and shocked at what he had just done he turned and looked at his Master. At that moment Christ looked at Peter, and beneath that grieved look, in which compassion and love for him were blended, Peter understood himself. He went out and wept bitterly. That look of Christ's broke his heart. Peter had come to the turning point, and bitterly did he repent his sin. He was like the publican in his contrition and repentance, and like the publican he found mercy. The look of Christ assured him of pardon. {COL 152.3}










Continuing: Neither Joseph nor Nicodemus had openly accepted the Saviour while He was living. They knew that such a step would exclude them from the Sanhedrin, and they hoped to protect Him by their influence in its councils. For a time they had seemed to succeed; but the wily priests, seeing their favor to Christ, had thwarted their plans. In their absence Jesus had been condemned and delivered to be crucified. Now that He was dead, they no longer concealed their attachment to Him. {Next Slide Please)




Continuing: While the disciples feared to show themselves openly as His followers, Joseph and Nicodemus came boldly to their aid. The help of these rich and honored men was greatly needed at this time. They could do for their dead Master what it was impossible for the poor disciples to do; and their wealth and influence protected them, in a great measure, from the malice of the priests and rulers. **{DA 773.4}**




Gently and reverently they removed with their own hands the body of Jesus from the cross. Their tears of sympathy fell fast as they looked upon His bruised and lacerated form. Joseph owned a new tomb, hewn in a rock. This he was reserving for himself; but it was near Calvary, and he now prepared it for Jesus. The body, together with the spices brought by Nicodemus, was carefully wrapped in a linen sheet, **{Next Slide Please}**




Continuing: and the Redeemer was borne to the tomb. There the three disciples straightened the mangled limbs, and folded the bruised hands upon the pulseless breast. The Galilean women came to see that all had been done that could be done for the lifeless form of their beloved Teacher. Then they saw the heavy stone rolled against the entrance of the tomb, and the Saviour was left at rest. **{Next Slide Please}**



Continuing: The women were last at the cross, and last at the tomb of Christ. While the evening shades were gathering, **Mary Magdalene and the other** Mary's lingered about the resting place of their Lord, shedding tears of sorrow over the fate of Him whom they loved. "And they returned, ... and rested the Sabbath day according to the commandment." Luke 23:56. {DA 774.1}




That was a never-to-be-forgotten Sabbath to the sorrowing disciples, and also to the priests, rulers, scribes, and people. At the setting of the sun on the evening of the preparation day the trumpets sounded, signifying that the Sabbath had begun. The Passover was observed as it had been for centuries, while He to whom it pointed had been slain by wicked hands, and lay in Joseph's tomb. On the Sabbath the courts of the temple were filled with worshipers. {Please Slide Next}




Continuing: The high priest from Golgotha was there, splendidly robed in his sacerdotal garments. White-turbaned priests, full of activity, performed their duties. But some present were not at rest as the blood of bulls and goats was offered for sin. They were not conscious that type had met antitype, that an infinite sacrifice had been made for the sins of the world. They knew not that there was no further value in the performance of the ritual service. **{Next Slide Please}**



Continuing: But never before had that service been witnessed with such conflicting feelings. The trumpets and musical instruments and the voices of the singers were as loud and clear as usual. But a sense of strangeness pervaded everything. **One after another inquired** about a strange event that had taken place. **{Next Slide Please}**



Continuing: Hitherto the most holy place had been sacredly guarded from intrusion. But now it was open to all eyes. The heavy veil of tapestry, made of pure linen, and beautifully wrought with gold, scarlet, and purple, was rent from top to bottom. The place where Jehovah had met with the high priest, to communicate His glory, **{Next Slide Please}**



Continuing: the place that had been God's sacred audience chamber, lay open to every eye,-a place no longer recognized by the Lord. With gloomy presentiments the priests ministered before the altar.
